

TIPS FOR TRAVELING IN AN RV WITH CHILDREN

An RV (motorhome) is the perfect vehicle for going on a family trip.

Advices for improved safety

The child car should be suitable for the particular installation system



a two-point seat belt (although a three-point belt is always preferable), a three-point seat belt, ISOFIX anchorages (check that the vehicle is equipped with these anchorages) or a combination of both.

Children under 135 cm tall must be seated on the rear seats in a suitable and approved child car seat.



The child car seat may only be put on the front seat if:

- The vehicle has no rear seats (very unlikely in an RV)
- The rear seats are already occupied by other children in child seats.
- A child restraint system cannot be affixed to the rear seats.

Ensure that children are using rear-facing child car seats for as long as possible.

Compulsory until 15 months old and highly recommendable until they reach 4 years old.



All baggage should be well-secured and physically separated from the passengers.

Pets should be traveling in their appropriate pet carriers.



Check the RV before setting out on your journey



We need to take into account the greater weight and size of the RV when driving

Observe all the rules of the road, especially those regarding maximum speeds

- **Freeways and highways:** 120 km/h for RVs with a maximum weight of less than or equal to 3,500 kg and 90 km/h for RVs over 3,500 kg
- **Main roads:** 90 km/h for RVs with a maximum weight equal to or less than 3,500 kg and 80 km/h for those which are heavier than this maximum weight.



Park the RV in a place where it does not inconvenience others.

Remember that you can only camp in designated sites.
